HORTICULTURAL DIVISION GENERAL RULES

- 1. Entries may be made Thursday April 5 from 2 PM through 9 AM Friday, April 6. All exhibitors must be off the floor by 9:00 AM. This rule will be strictly enforced.
- 2. Entry cards for exhibits will be available at the show. Only the top half of the entry card needs to be filled in.
- 3. Entries, awards, and ribbons may not be removed until 5 PM Saturday, April 7.

RULES FOR HORTICULTURAL EXHIBITS

ENTRIES

- 4. All classes are open to anyone who grows daffodils except where specified otherwise.
- An exhibitor may make as many entries as desired in any class provided each entry is a different cultivar or species or an entirely different collection of cultivars and/or species.
- 6. All blooms in the Horticultural Division except the ADS Challenge classes must have been grown in the open by the exhibitor. Miniatures and daffodils grown and shown in their containers may be grown in protected areas.
- Wedging material and containers for cut flower exhibits will be furnished by the show committee. Except for daffodils grown and shown in their containers, no daffodil foliage is permitted.
- 8. All collections of five or more stems must be exhibited with each cultivar or species in a separate container.

LABELING

- 9. Each cultivar or species must be correctly labeled with its name (or number) and division. The originator's name must appear on the label in American bred classes except seedlings shown by the originator. The originator is the person who first flowered the bulb regardless of who made the cross and/or planted the seed. Entries in the Classic and Historic sections should be labeled with the year of registration (or introduction).
- 10. Exhibits that are not named or are incorrectly named will not be judged. Correct classification and labeling shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor.
- 11. No label may be changed, specimen added, removed, altered, or substituted after judging has begun or after an award has been placed.

INTERMEDIATES, MINIATURES, AND SEEDLINGS

- 12. An intermediate daffodil is a standard daffodil in divisions 1, 2, 3, 4, or 11 having a single floret whose diameter is typically greater than 50 mm through 80 mm. Intermediate daffodils may be entered in classes for standard daffodils as well as classes reserved for intermediate daffodils.
- 13. Miniature daffodils may be shown only in classes for miniatures. A miniature daffodil is any cultivar on the current ADS Approved List of Miniatures, except as noted in the Historic Section. Also, any named, numbered, or species daffodil which appears graceful, with all its parts proportionately small, may be exhibited in Miniatures classes and is eligible for all ADS awards, except that only numbered seedlings shown by the originator are eligible for the ADS Miniature Rose Ribbon. The judges may decline to judge any exhibit containing an unapproved miniature that they consider too large for these classes.
- 14. Blooms of seedlings may be exhibited in all classes for named cultivars. ALL SEEDLINGS MUST BE IDENTIFIED BY A NUMBER DESIGNATION ASSIGNED BY THE ORIGINATOR. If the exhibitor is not the originator, the name of the originator must be included as part of the identification.

AWARDS

- 15. Each stem in an exhibit of cut flowers receiving an ADS Award must score 90 or more on the appropriate ADS Scale of Points.
- 16. Only one first, one second, and one third award may be given in each class. Honorable mention awards may also be given if merited but only if first, second, and third have been awarded. First, second, third, and honorable mention awards may be withheld by the judges if in their opinion the exhibit is not worthy. If a blue ribbon (first place) has been awarded in a class eligible for an ADS ribbon, the ADS Award may not be withheld.
- 17. The decision of the judges is final. If an error is discovered in an exhibit after completion of judging, any award placed thereon (ADS, Special, or Ribbon) shall be forfeited by the

exhibitor. If an error is discovered before the judging is completed, the class must be rejudged.

MISCELLANEOUS

- 18. The Show Committee reserves the right to subdivide classes by cultivar or color code when there are three or more worthy exhibits of the same cultivar or color code and if a sufficient number of worthy exhibits is left in the class.
- 19. The Royal Horticultural Society System of Classification will be used. The labeling authority is *Daffodils to Show and Grow* as amended each year in the December ADS *Daffodil Journal* supplemented by the current information in the ADS Internet daffodil database, DaffSeek.org.
- 20. In the class descriptions, the words "pink cup," etc. define classes where that color is solid, 2W-P, or present in two adjacent zones, 2W-GPP. The words "pink in cup," etc. are used for classes that include both solid and rimmed cups of the same color. "Colored" is any color but white. A reverse bicolor has a predominantly yellow perianth and a predominantly white cup where "predominantly" means at least two adjacent zones must be coded the designated color. A "green" daffodil has a predominantly green perianth and/or corona.
- 21. Blooms in the ADS Challenge section will not be considered for awards other than for their respective class and for the ADS W.A. Bender Ribbon.

Daffodils in this section will be judged using the cultivar scale. Entries in these classes are eligible for the Gold, White and Purple Ribbons.

SECTIONS H & I – HISTORIC DAFFODILS

This section is open to all cultivars, i.e., not species, introduced or in gardens before 1940. All cultivars shall be labeled with name, division number, and year of registration (or introduction). The earliest date shown in the American Daffodil Society's online database DaffSeek.org be the authority. *NOTE: Miniature daffodils registered prior to 1940, but removed from the ADS Approved Miniature List over time, shall be eligible for entry in the Historic Section class for Miniatures--and only in the Historic Section. These "de-listed" cultivars include W. P. Milner, Rip van Winkle, Colleen Bawn, Agnes Harvey, Rockery Beauty, Pencrebar, and Cobweb. They are eligible for all Historic Awards.*

The Classification Committee may subdivide each class by year of registration and/or division, regardless of the number or quality of exhibits in each subdivision prior to judging. Daffodils in this section will be judged using the ADS Historic Scale of Points. Winners of the Historic single stem, 3-stem, and collection of 5 are eligible for consideration for the Gold, Mini-Gold, White, Mini-White, and Purple Ribbons, in which case they are to be judged on the respective Cultivar scale for this purpose.

No bloom or exhibit in this section shall be eligible for any ADS award other than the ADS awards for container-grown daffodils. Rule No. 18 is extended to permit subdividing classes by daffodil division.

Hybridizers' Classes: Exhibitors must be ADS members. All flowers must be considered appropriate for the ADS Approved List of Miniature Daffodils for an award to be given. Identification of all blooms in the next three classes, both named and numbered, must be concealed until after judging. To facilitate the selection of candidates for the Miniature Rose Ribbon, seedlings are to be marked by a check on the card facing the judges. All flowers must be hybridized and originated by the exhibitor. Flowers may be from any division.

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
SECTION Q - AMERICAN DAFFODIL SOCIETY CHALLENGE AWARDS

Blooms may be grown in any manner deemed appropriate by the exhibitor. The exhibitor must be the raiser of each cultivar but need not be the grower. The raiser is the person who grew the cultivar to first flowering. If a raiser is unable to attend the National Show but wishes to enter a Challenge Class, another person may, with the raiser's permission, stage the entry on the raiser's behalf and under the raiser's name. Identification of the blooms and the raiser must be concealed until after judging. The cultivars included may be either standards or miniatures. **The best bloom in this section will receive the W. A. Bender Ribbon.** Each stem must score 90 points or more and is not eligible for any other ADS awards. Open to any exhibitor.



PHOTOGRAPHY DIVISION

The 2018 ADS National Convention in Franklin, Tennessee, celebrates the daffodil with "Music City 2018". Photographers are encouraged to compose their entries according to accepted principles of two-dimensional design.

- 1. There is no entry fee, and exhibitors do not need to be members of any Daffodil Society.
- Entries must be the creative work of the exhibitor and must contain images of one or more daffodils as required by the class. The emphasis of the images is to "Celebrate the Daffodil".
- Photographs may not have been awarded a first place, or blue ribbon, in a previous ADS National show.
- 4. Classes are open to color or monochrome photographs and will be subdivided if needed. An exhibitor may enter up to two photographs per class with a maximum of eight photographs in total.
- 5. Photographs should be mounted on lightweight stiff card stock or foam board so that no mounting surface is exposed. No border, matting, glass, or framing is allowed.
- 6. Minimum print size is 5 x 5 inches, and maximum perimeter of 52 inches. Nonstandard sizes are acceptable.
- 7. The photographer's name and address should be located on the back of the mounting at the middle of the bottom edge.
- 8. An official entry card is to be filled out and attached to each photograph on the right side 2" from the top edge. Titles may be listed on the entry cards, but are not mandatory. Entry cards will be available at the show or can be downloaded from the American Daffodil Society web site daffodilusa.org. Navigate to "References" then "National Show Guide, Templates, and Forms" and scroll down to "Photography Entry Cards".
- 9. First, Second, Third, and Honorable Mention awards will be given as merited in each subdivision. The ADS Wells Knierim Ribbon will be awarded for the Best Photograph in Show. Each Photography Judge may award a Judge's Choice ribbon to one photograph of his/her choice.
- 10. Entries will be accepted from 2 pm until 7 pm on April 5th, Franklin Marriott Cool Springs, 700 Cool Springs Blvd., Franklin, TN 37067. If the exhibitor cannot attend the show, entries may also be mailed to Annie Owen with the associated registration information as per Rules 7 and 8. Entries must be received by Annie by Friday March 30th to be entered in the show. Mail to:

- 11. Entries must be retrieved by the exhibitor or a designated alternate at the close of the show after 5 pm on April 7, 2018. Exhibitors who will not be attending the show should make prior arrangements for the return of their photographs. Entries not picked up by noon on April 8 become the property of the ADS and may be disposed of or used in future displays and publications.
- 12. The American Daffodil Society will exercise caution in safeguarding exhibits, but cannot assume responsibility for lost or damaged photographs.

THE HERMITAGE

DAFFODILS IN NATURE, LANDSCAPE, GARDEN or NATURALIZED HABITAT (May include people or animals but the primary subject must be daffodils.)

The Hermitage is the home of the seventh President Andrew Jackson. A beautiful one acre garden adjacent to the house has something in bloom all during the growing season beginning in February with daffodils. *The Hermitage Hotel*

HAT TRICK

DAFFODILS WITH ANIMALS OR INSECTS Animals, domestic or wildlife, or insects with daffodils. (May include people but the primary subjects must be animals or insects and daffodils)

The Nashville Predators hockey team was named the Best Sports Franchise in the US in 2017. A natural **hat trick** occurs when a player scores three consecutive goals, uninterrupted by any other player scoring for either team.

MANUEL (PRONOUNCED MAN-WELL)

DAFFODILS WITH PEOPLE

Manual is a clothing designer of Country Cowboy Couture whose creations are truly a work of art and can be found in museums nationwide, including Metropolitan, the Rock 'n' Roll Hall of Fame and even the Smithsonian.

ADVENTURE SCIENCE CENTER

YOUTH PHOTOGRAPHS. Open to any youth 20 years or younger. Photograph may be in any style.

As the premiere learning center in Middle Tennessee, **Adventure Science Center** is home to hands-on science exhibits for the entire family. *Adventure Science Center*

TOOTSIE'S ORCHID LOUNGE

CELEBRATING DAFFODILS AND MUSIC. A photo that celebrates daffodils along with some aspect of music. (It could be a musical instrument, sheet music, musical symbols, etc.)

Tootsie's Orchid Lounge, a Nashville country music institution and world-famous honkytonk, has operated across the alley from the Ryman Auditorium almost continuously since 1960. *Tootsie's Orchid Lounge*

ARTISTIC DESIGN DIVISION

NGC STANDARD FLOWER SHOW

DESIGN AWARDS AND RIBBONS

The National Garden Club Standard System of Awarding will be used which allows only one first (Blue ribbon) scoring 90 or above, only one second (Red ribbon) scoring 85 or above, only one third (Yellow ribbon) scoring 80 or above, and one or more honorable mention (White ribbon) scoring 75 or above in each class where merited.

In Division II, the Designer's Choice Award may be awarded to the highest scoring exhibit, scoring 95 or above, providing all other requirements are met. Awards may be withheld if not merited.

This schedule was written using the new NGC Handbook for Flower Shows revised 2017.

RULES FOR DESIGN EXHIBITORS

- 1. All affiliated garden club members, including Student and Accredited Judges, are eligible to enter Classes 1-6 as well as any member of the American Daffodil Society. Entry reservations may be made by calling Pam Braun at 615/794-3553 (Home), 615/364-1166 (Cell) or email: braun3@earthlink.net. The show will be in Convention Hall, Salon 4, at the Marriott Cool Springs Hotel, 700 Cool Springs Blvd, Franklin, TN 37067 615/261-6100.
- 2. After a reservation has been accepted for a specific class, the exhibitor is responsible for obtaining a substitute if unable to exhibit. This substitute's name must be given to Pam Braun before the date of the show.
- Designs may be placed between 2:00 pm 7:00 p.m. on Thursday, April 5, 2018 or between 7:00 a.m. 9:00 a.m. on Friday, April 6, 2018. All exhibits must be in place by 9:00 a.m. on Friday. Designs may not be removed before 5:00 p.m. on Saturday, April 7, 2018. Exhibitor has until 7:00 p.m. (2 hours) to dismantle and remove a design.
- 4. After the design has been placed, exhibitor must check out with Pam Braun or Bonnie Campbell.
- 5. Each design must contain at least two daffodils.
- 6. Design must be the work of one exhibitor and not exhibited in a previous show. An exhibitor may enter as many classes as desired, but only one exhibit per class.
- 7. Use of bases, accessories and featured objects are permitted. Contrived flowers constructed of fresh and/or dried plant material must appear as "fantasy flowers" or foliage. Treating of other dried plant materials is permitted.
- 8. Objects such as feathers, nests, coral, sponges, antlers, horns, etc. are permitted when tastefully used. No artificial flowers, foliage, fruit, berries, or vegetables are permitted.
- 9. Landscapes or scenes are not permitted in the Design Division.
- 10. Fresh plant material may NEVER be treated in any manner.

RULES FOR DESIGN EXHIBITORS - Continued

- 11. Any non-perishable food products are allowed but cut fruits or vegetables are not allowed.
- **12**. Exhibitor must include a 3" x 5" card listing ALL plant materials used. The card may also have an explanation of how the class title has been interpreted. Cards will be provided by the Show Committee.
- 13. Judges are required to <u>sign</u> and <u>date</u> all blue ribbon winning entry cards and Top Award Rosettes. They are to leave comment cards on all design exhibits. All entry cards for exhibits scoring 90+ should be marked 90+, signed and dated.
- Classes 1-3 are Designer's Choice exhibitor has complete freedom to choose plant materials and other components within NGC policies. (See the NGC Handbook for Flower Shows, Pages 80 & 81, Rev. 2017)
- **15.** Classes 4-6 are Petite Designs. The best design in this section will be awarded the Petite Award. Requirements are listed under each class in this section.
- 16. Judging will begin at 9:30 a.m. on Friday, April 6, 2018 and will be in accordance with National Garden Clubs Standard System of Awarding. The decision of the judges will be final.
- 17. All staging properties will be furnished by the Show Committee.
- **18**. All living members of the Animal Kingdom, e.g., mammals, birds, fish, etc., and taxidermal representation of the same, are <u>not</u> permitted in competitive designs in the Standard Show.
- **19**. Religious symbols used must be displayed in a respectful manner and in accordance with policies of local religious organizations.
- 20. The American flag and other national flags must be displayed in a respectful manner. In order not to offend, American and other national flags may not be incorporated into any competitive designs, nor be used as underlays, swags, or the like.

ARTISTIC DESIGN DIVISION CLASSES Eligible for Designer's Choice Award MUSIC CITY, USA

Class 1. Bright Lights and Music

An Illuminary Design. Four Creative Designs incorporating light/s for special effect as an integral part of the design. Placed on one half of a 6' L x 29" H table. The Show Committee will provide tables covered in black placed against a neutral wall. A Background Panel (Niche) 36" high, 24" wide with 12" sides are required, designer's choice of color, to be provided by the exhibitor or requested from Pam Braun. Design not to exceed schedule dimension of height, width and depth. Electricity will be available. Underlays are permitted and strongly suggested.

Class 2. Get Your Guitar On

A Multi-Rhythmic Design. Four Creative Designs, must have two or more

rhythmic lines (one being dominate). Placed on one half of a 6' L x 29" H table. The show will provide tables covered in black placed against a neutral wall. A Background Panel (Niche) 36" high 24", wide with 12" sides are required, designer's choice of color, to be provided by the exhibitor or requested from Pam Braun. Design not to exceed schedule dimension of height, width and depth. Underlays are permitted and strongly suggested.

Class 3. Bluegrass Rhythm

Four Creative Designs using the color blue somewhere in the design with emphasis on daffodils. Placed on one half of a 6' L x 29" H table. The show will provide tables covered in black placed against a neutral wall. A Background Panel (Niche) 36" high, 24" wide with 12" sides are required, designer's choice of color, to be provided by the exhibitor, or requested from Pam Braun. Design not to exceed schedule dimension of height, width and depth. Underlays are permitted and strongly suggested.

Class 4. Southern Charm

A Creative Petite Design 8" high and no more than 8" wide and 8" deep. The design will be placed on a 29" table with a 12" riser on top. The Show Committee will provide the table and riser 10" wide covered in black against neutral wall. An 8" by 8" background and/or underlay permitted but not required.

Class 5. Tennessee Waltz

A Multi-Rhythmic Petite Design 8" high and no more than 8" wide and 8" deep. The design will be placed on a 29" table with a 12" riser on top. The Show Committee will provide the table and riser 10" wide covered in black against neutral wall. Background and underlay permitted but not required. An 8"by 8" background and/or underlay permitted but not required.

Class 6. Down On The Farm

A Creative Petite Design 12" high and no more than 12" wide and 12" deep.

The design will be placed on a 29" table with a 12" riser on top. The Show Committee will provide the table and riser 14" wide covered in black against neutral wall. A 12" background and/or underlay permitted but not required.

ROYAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY SYSTEM OF CLASSIFICATION

For garden purposes, daffodils are classified in 13 divisions where the division number specifies the form and the letters (color code) specify the colors. For example:

1 W-Y = a trumpet daffodil with white perianth segments ("petals") and yellow corona ("trumpet"). 2 Y-YYO = a large-cupped daffodil, all yellow except for a band of orange at corona ("cup") rim.

11b W-O/Y/W = a papillon daffodil with white perianth segments and longitudinal bands of orange, yellow and white in the corona, with orange predominant.

Whether of wild or cultivated origin, once a selection has been distinguished by a cultivar name, it should be assigned to Divisions 1-12. Daffodils distinguished solely by botanical name should be assigned to Division 13.

The characteristics for Divisions 5 to 10 are given for guidance only; they are not all necessarily expected to be present in every cultivar assigned to those divisions.

DIVISION 1 — TRUMPET DAFFODIL CULTIVARS.

One flower to a stem; corona ("trumpet") as long as or longer than the perianth segments ("petals").

DIVISION 2 — LARGE-CUPPED DAFFODIL CULTIVARS

One flower to a stem; corona ("cup") more than one-third, but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments ("petals").

DIVISION 3 — SMALL-CUPPED DAFFODIL CULTIVARS

One flower to a stem; corona ("cup") not more than one-third the length of the perianth segments ("petals").

DIVISION 4 — DOUBLE DAFFODIL CULTIVARS

One or more flowers to a stem, with doubling of the perianth segments or the corona or both. DIVISION 5 — TRIANDRUS DAFFODIL CULTIVARS

Characteristics of *N. triandrus* clearly evident; usually two or more pendent flowers to a stem; perianth segments reflexed.

DIVISION 6 — CYCLAMINEUS DAFFODIL CULTIVARS

Characteristics of *N. cyclamineus* clearly evident: one flower to a stem; perianth segments significantly reflexed; flower at an acute angle to the stem, with a very short pedicel ("neck").

DIVISION 7 — JONQUILLA AND APODANTHUS CULTIVARS

Characteristics of Sections Jonquilla or Apodanthi clearly evident: one to five (rarely eight) flowers to a stem; perianth segments spreading or reflexed; corona cup-shaped, funnel-shaped, or flared, usually wider than long; flowers usually fragrant.

DIVISION 8 — TAZETTA DAFFODIL CULTIVARS

Characteristics of Section Tazettae clearly evident: usually three to twenty flowers to a stout stem; perianth segments spreading, not reflexed; flowers usually fragrant.

DIVISION 9 — POETICUS DAFFODIL CULTIVARS

Characteristics of *N. poeticus* and related species: perianth segments pure white; corona very short or disc-shaped, not more than one-fifth the length of the perianth segments; corona usually with a green and/or yellow center and red rim, but sometimes wholly or partly of other colors; anthers usually set at two distinct levels; flowers fragrant.

DIVISION 10 - BULBOCODIUM DAFFODIL CULTIVARS

Characteristics of Section Bulbocodium clearly evident: usually one flower to a stem; perianth segments insignificant compared with the dominant corona; anthers dorsifixed (i.e., attached more or less centrally to the filament); filament and style usually curved.

DIVISION 11 - SPLIT-CORONA DAFFODIL CULTIVARS

Corona split – usually for more than half its length.

a) Collar Daffodils. Split-corona daffodils with the corona segments opposite the perianth segments; the corona segments usually in two whorls of three.

b) Papillon Daffodils. Split-corona daffodils with the corona segments alternate to the perianth segments; the corona segments usually in a single whorl of six.

DIVISION 12 — OTHER DAFFODIL CULTIVARS

Daffodil cultivars which do not fit the definition of any other division.

DIVISION 13 - DAFFODILS DISTINGUISHED SOLELY BY BOTANICAL NAME

SECTION TAPEINANTHUS

Autumn flowering; one to four flowers to a rounded stem; leaves very narrow, glaucous, not always present on flowering bulbs; flower ascending, yellow; corona absent or rudimentary; anthers widely exserted from the tube, much shorter than the filaments, dorsifixed. SECTION SEROTINI

Autumn flowering; usually one to two flowers to a rounded stem; leaves very narrow, glaucous, not always present on flowering bulbs; perianth segments pure white, usually twisted; corona very short, yellow, orange, or green; anthers included in or slightly exserted from the tube, longer than the filaments, dorsifixed; flowers fragrant. SECTION AURELIA

Autumn flowering; three to twelve flowers to a compressed stem; leaves flat, not channeled, glaucous; flowers white; corona rudimentary or absent; filaments unequal in length; anthers exserted from the tube, dorsifixed; flowers fragrant.

SECTION TAZETTAE

Autumn to spring flowering; three (rarely two) to twenty flowers to a usually compressed stem; leaves flat or channeled, usually glaucous; flowers white, yellow, or bicolored; anthers included in or slightly exserted from the tube, much longer than the filaments, dorsifixed; flowers fragrant. The rounded stem and green leaves of *N. aureus* atypical, also the orange corona of *N. elegans*.

SECTION NARCISSUS

Spring flowering; usually one flower (exceptionally two to four) to a compressed stem; leaves flat, not channeled, glaucous; perianth segments pure white; corona disc-shaped or very shallow, sometimes of a single color, but usually with base green, mid-zone yellow, and rim red or orange and often scarious; anthers partly exserted from the tube, much longer than the filaments, dorsifixed; flowers fragrant. This section covers *N. poeticus*. SECTION JONOULLA

Spring flowering; one to five (rarely eight) flowers to a rounded stem; leaves narrow or semicylindrical, green; flowers yellow, never white; perianth segments spreading or reflexed; corona usually cup-shaped, usually wider than long; anthers included in or partly exserted from the tube, much longer than the filaments, dorsifixed; flowers fragrant. The autumn flowering, green-flowered *N. viridiflorus* is atypical.

SECTION APODANTHI

Spring flowering; one flower or two to five to a somewhat compressed stem; leaves narrow, channeled, glaucous; flowers white or yellow, never bicolored; perianth segments spreading or slightly reflexed; corona cup-shaped, funnel-shaped, or flared, usually wider than long; anthers included in the tube, or three included and three exserted, much longer than the filaments, dorsifixed.

SECTION GANYMEDES

Spring flowering; one flower or two to six to an elliptical or cylindrical stem; flowers pendent, white, yellow, or somewhat bicolored; leaves flat or semi-cylindrical; perianth segments reflexed; corona cup-shaped (rarely campanulate); anthers three included in the tube, three exserted (often beyond the corona), equal to or much shorter than the filaments, dorsifixed. This section covers *N. triandrus.*

SECTION BULBOCODIUM

Autumn to spring flowering; one flower to a rounded stem; leaves narrow, semi-cylindrical; flowers white or yellow; perianth segments insignificant compared with the dominant corona; anthers widely exserted from the tube (often beyond the corona), much shorter than the filaments (which are usually curved), dorsifixed.

SECTION PSEUDONARCISSUS

Spring flowering; usually one flower to a more or less compressed or sometimes rounded stem; leaves flat or channeled, usually glaucous; flowers white, yellow, or bicolored; perianth segments usually spreading or inflexed; corona more or less cylindrical, often flared at mouth, yellow or white (never orange or red); anthers exserted from the tube, equal to or shorter than the filaments, sub-basifixed. The green leaves, rounded stem, and strongly reflexed perianth segments of *N. cyclamineus* and the two to four flowers to a stem of *N. longispathus* and *N. nevadensis* are atypical.

WILD HYBRIDS

Natural hybrids distinguished by botanical names are also assigned to this division.

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
